Constructed of a lightweight wooden framework covered with sealskin, a kayak took real skill to paddle. Hunting tools, such as a lance, a throwing harpoon, and a rack to hold a coiled harpoon line were secured to the kayak, within easy reach of the paddler.

The swift and streamlined boats were just one kind of specialized transportation developed by Arctic peoples. Others included a larger open boat for whale hunting called an *umiak*, and a sled pulled by harnessed dogs for travel This region reaches from the southern edge of the Northeast culture area to the Gulf of Mexico; from east to west, it stretches from the Atlantic Ocean to somewhat west of the Mississippi valley. <u>Once home</u> to numerous large and small Tribes, European encroachment and subsequent domination of colonial narratives contributed to re-focusing the Indigenous landscape on those Tribes that would come to be known as the "Five Civilized Tribes(Perhaps the best-known indigenous Nations originally from this region are the Cherokee, Choctaw, Chickasaw, Creek, and Seminole)..., known as the Five Civilized Tribes. Traditionally, most Many Southeastern tribes lived in settled villages and practiced agriculture prior to the arrival of Europeans; most in the Southeast spoke Muskogean languages; <u>although</u> there were also some Siouan language <u>Tribes</u>, speakers and one Iroquoian-speaking <u>Tribegroup (, the Cherokee), and many Tribes with</u> unrelated languages (such as Natchez, Chitimacha and Tunica)...

The arrival of European settlers on the Atlantic coast marked the beginning of the loss of homelands for these tribes. <u>Some Tribes voluntarily relocated to avoid European encroachment, and</u> The Indian Removal Act resulted in the forceful removal of <u>many</u> tribes to what is now Oklahoma. With the introduction of the concept of allotment, making individual landownership rather than collective landownership the law of the land, tribes suffered further, and lands were <u>lost to stolen by</u> non-Native people.

In addition to numerous broken treaties, forced removals and other acts of aggression, the US Congress developed policies designed to further erode tribal sovereignty such as the 1953 Termination Policy. <u>However</u>, Tribes persisted in their efforts towards renewed sovereignty, resulting in legislation such as the Principal Chief Act (1970), which authorized each of the Five Civilized Tribes of Oklahoma to take back their government and popularly elected tribal officials once again. Another major milestone was achieved with the passage of PL 93-638 (1975), the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance
