The members attended local school districts' "colored schools" before 1954. Both of the old schools are the subject of marker applications filed in 2012. The VVCHC has begun a survey of San Felipe Cemetery. There are no extant records, no association, no maps, and very irregular burial practices. The Commission has most of the grave markers listed and online. Val Verde County Historical Commission now has a website, <vvchc.net>. The three previous efforts failed; Chair Braudaway learned HTML to build up and maintain the website created by Lynn Masterson from Southwest Texas Junior College. has no formal or central agency or liaisons to the six Native American Tribes with Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act ("NAGPRA") jurisdiction over remains and artifacts in Texas, the working relationships, protocols and cultural understandings between governmental entities and the six tribes (Alabama-Coushatta, Coushatta, Tonkawa, Kiowa, Mescalero Apache and Comanche) were deficient to handle the formalities and sensitivities of reburial and repatriation of Native American remains and artifacts for such a large and important finding. The remains and artifacts were Native American remains and artifacts in different earthen strata covering the Paleo Period (7,000 – 13, 000 B.C.) Archaic Period (700 A.D – 1,000 B.C.) and Historic occupation (1780-1900) and the HCHC was served by TxDOT on July 2 2012 with a petition for expedited exhumation of remains under Texas Health and Safety Code ("HSC") Section 711.010, known as the "Unknown or Abandoned Cemetery" law. In late August, TxDOT amended its petition to include relief under HSC Section 711.0004, known as the "Removal of Remains with certain Consents/Notices" law. HCHC members took the following actions: reviewed pleadings; performed research to gain an understanding of NAGPRA, and the concerns and inadequacies of state and local laws in addressing unique problems related to grave desecration and thefts of unmarked Native American and Native Hawaiian burial sites; performed research to understand the expectations and responsibilities under federal and state antiquities and permitting laws with respect to consultation with Native American tribes; consulted with experts in the field of archaeology and historical landscape architecture; met with attorneys and secured representation to analyze laws and respond in court; provided background information and other evidence to multiple attorneys; conducted a visit to the Site before the September 10, 2012 District Court hearing, and took photos; started settlement discussions that would conform with law and cultural expectations; appeared in District Court on September 10, 2011. While the Court granted the State's request, it was learned that notice to the tribes was not in conformity with law and coupled with a judgment that had inconsistencies and was against the weight of historical and cultural information learned by HCHC, HCHC authorized its attorneys to appeal to the Court of Appeals; conducted two more visits to the Site, and took photos with the second Site visit included visits by experts, and then later federal regulators to analyze options. in England in 1629 and for such authorizations to have been secured with geographic references, Europeans would have passed through the area or interfaced with inhabiting Native Americans many years prior to the establishment in the 1800's of Texas as a State; assisted Harris County attorneys in the preparation of correspondence, District Court motions and affidavits, and filings in the Courts of Appeals consistent with the cultural and historical information and importance learned about Site, with the hope of preserving history; while the case was still pending, at two separate HCHC meetings, had counsel present to assist in action items. At the first meeting in early September, HCHC members received a first report on the litigation and some preliminary concepts, and authorized the HCHC chair to serve as a liaison in settlement and court matters. At a meeting in November, HCHC members received photographs and a report, and provided guidance that action continue consistent with the historical and cultural missions and goals of a diverse historic commission and county; engaged in settlement negotiations with the State, and continued to offer the members and attorneys of HCHC for any consultations with the tribes. While TxDOT never included HCHC in November settlement negotiations with the tribes, settlement of the case was formulated (completed in early 2013) whereby the State would withdraw the District Court judgment and dismiss its case, and HCHC would dismiss its appeal with the Court of Appeals. The results were precedential: while TxDOT and the Army Corps of Engineers traditionally engaged in a removal, then-analysis, of Native American remains, because of conditions and events that came into existence while the Site was under the care, custody and control of TxDOT; the Native American tribes requested a solution that was raised by HCHC's attorney knowledgeable in Native American matters; the solution being a burial-in-place but while burial-in-place was at first opposed by State and Federal authorities, given further evidence and the request by the Tribes, it was adopted as an action plan. While there is a final and measurable result to the Court case as to the treatment of remains in this particular case, there is more work to be done in the area that recently comprised HCHC's lead attorney on Native American matters was asked to present in Austin at a State Bar conference on the case and subject matter, and the HCHC Chair was present to answer questions at a presentation attended by a diverse crowd including law students, archaeologists, many state agencies and many tribes being that the case has also drawn national attention, and HCHC counsel is responding to those requests.

We had a slow start, especially getting the recorded interviews transcribed. We continued the project in 2012 but corrected some of our earlier problems by creating a set of procedures. Now the project is flowing much better. We are now able to get interviews transcribed in a reasonable amount of time. To further our goals of preserving Limestone County history, the CHC undertook a new project in 2012 to create a photographic history of the county. The publication of the book will help promote the county's rich heritage and will aid in preserving the photographic images for future generations. It also led to the creation of a digital photo collection that will continue to grow and provide a vital source of information in the future. The project also strengthened our relationships with the county museum board, local libraries, and Baylor University. We created an action plan several years ago, and we continue to revise and update it once a year to evaluate our successes and needs. Dr. Charles Bullick, steward for the Texas Historical Commission, and local archeologist Brenda Jackson shared past / present archeological projects in our area / region at a bimonthly meeting after which a very informative question and answer period was held. On a cold, windy Saturday morning, a number of JCHC members accepted the invitation to take a boat tour of the Neches River hosted by JCHC member Dr. Richard Bothel of Beaumont's Lamar University. If needed, DCHC marker committee would provide assistance with the research and historical narrative. The two bridges that have not been moved are eligible for THCA marker, one of which has already received a RTHL and is listed in the National Register. DCHC markers have already been purchased for two of the relocated bridges. year involved Archaeology at Artesian Park in downtown Corpus Christi. Donated as a park to the City of Corpus Christi in 1854, General Zachary Taylor established a military camp at this site in 1845 where an Artesian well had been established. The soldiers, led by Zachary Taylor, consisted of many future Civil War officers including Ulysses S. Grant, and the camp occupied land spanning from approximately the north end of Artesian Park to our North Beach. Although the Artesian well yielded foul-tasting water, in the late 19th century people from within and outside of Corpus Christi began to visit it for its reported healing powers. Some reportedly bottled it to sell elsewhere. Throughout the last 150 years, the park has been the setting for many picnics, band concerts, weddings, festivals, and shuffleboard and dominoes games, as well as patriotic rallies during both World War I and World War II. The park has also been a location for debates on the meaning of civil rights. Two of the most important Mexican-American civil rights groups in the United States: LULAC and the American GI Forum were founded in Corpus Christi and rallies held here had significant impact on their formation. The park includes a zero mile marker, the spot from which all distances to Corpus Christi are to be measured, a granite monument to Taylor's encampment constructed by the Daughters of the American Revolution in the early twentieth century, and a THC historical marker placed there in 1976. Our goal was to engage the local community with the history of downtown Corpus Christi and archeological research. Our project took place from June 22-25 where community members observed and participated in an archeological excavation and listened to short presentations on archeological techniques and the history of Artesian Park. An estimated 200 people attended the event, including members of local organizations, such as the South Texas Alliance of Indigenous Peoples, the Coastal Bend Archeological Society, and the Boy Scouts, as well as college students, college professors and other local residents. Some attendees also shared their recollections of the park and downtown Corpus Christi as part of an oral history component. Attendees learned about local history, took part in an archeological excavation and enriched the historical record of downtown Corpus Christi by sharing their memories for an oral history collection to be housed at the Corpus Christi Public Library. Artifacts and oral histories that resulted from the project will provide historians, archaeologists and community members with useful resources for research on local history. Commission members operated a children's activity area, offering educational activities relating to archeology and the history of downtown Corpus Christi. We had great coverage in newspapers and financial support from Humanites Texas for this project and in turn, we endorsed the submission of an application for this park to receive a Texas Lone Star Legacy park designation.

| 123 | Comal County Initiating a county survey of previously unknown historic resources that will benefit county decision makers like county commissioners and county staff for preservation conscious decisions. New Braunfels and Comal County is growing rapidly and the county survey is necessary for smart planning. On March 29, 2012 a CLG Grant contract was signed by the Comal County Judge for the purpose of a county wide survey of historic resources and on April 20, 2012, our CHC signed a contract with Hardy, Heck and Moore (HHM) to perform the survey. With the \$40,000 received from Comal County and \$40,000 received as a THC CLG Grant, we were able to begin the survey of ¾ of the county. Presentations were made to the City of Schertz, City of Garden Ridge, Comal County Commissioners Court and on May 7, 2012 a Kickoff meeting was held at the public library involving the THC, HHM, CCHC, Commissioners and the public. Letters describing the project and granting ROE were sent to property owners in May and field survey work was initiated by HHM in August. Between Aug 1-Sept 17, field teams documented 669 historic resources on 218 parcels of land. HHM is attempting to survey all properties where ROE was obtained to the maximum 800 resources set in the scope of work. Over 1,100 digital photos were taken and contact sheets with the photographs provided to our CCHC for viewing. The deadline for reporting to our CCHC is summer 2013 and for the project September 2013. This past year, we requested funds from the county to complete the survey of the remaining ¼ of the county and have applied for THC CLG grant funds for this second project. The CHC is also assisting Dr. Montgomery and his non-profit Texas Center for Regional Studies with the April 2013 "Texas Legacy Fest," a two day celebration of the 200th anniversary of the first republic of Texas in 1813, known then as the Green Flag Republic. The Greater Conroe Chamber of Commerce, the non-profit Friends of the Flag Foundation, and the Conroe Convention and Visitors Bureau are also engaged in this project. It is hoped that this event will not only develop more multi-cultural cooperation concerning the celebration of Texas history of all cultures and races, but serve as a springboard for a "Cradle of Texas Road" by which many of the counties in our area will partner to celebrate the Texas War of Independence, particularly since the 200th anniversary is only two decades away. Members of the CHC are also assisting a non-profit organization—Conroe Live—in what has become an annual "Celebrate Conroe" historical event which permits visitors to step back in time 100 years ago where they experience music, clothing, food and other entertainment of that era. The goal is to restore community pride in Conroe's heritage and its old downtown commercial buildings, thus preserving them from demolition. Presentations were made by Dr. Loudon & her students as well as Petr Justa, an International Conservator from the Czech Republic. We continue to work with Dr. Loudon's advice and have plans to digitally record other historic buildings in our county and area. The beauty of this technology allows not only a two-dimensional drawing of the structure but the hundreds of thousands of data points allow a three-dimensional model to be made of the structure. Dr. Loudon has worked at historic sites all over the world and she and her students were chosen to make detailed lasar maps of the Statue of Liberty. Since no other actual plans were made during the construction of this statue, their important work would actually allow this historic icon to be completely restored if destroyed. We feel very fortunate to have Dr. Loudon here to help us and look forward to working with her and her classes. Our group has plans to record other historic buildings in our area. We were also able to dedicate a new historical marker at one of our early county cemeteries near Ropesville in May of 2012. The Ben J. Rogers Regional Visitors Center is always on standby to supply information to be mailed to the tour companies for help in selecting areas to visit. A special partnership the JCHC has is with Triangle Metals, Inc. in Nederland. Historical markers damaged by storms or vandals are professionally repaired by this local company at a reasonable price and in a timely manner. | 82 | <p>In Nueces County, Historical Commission members are working together with land owners, Texas A&M University students, previous residents and descendants of farm workers at our Flinn Cemetery site and have established a Rancho Colorado Service Learning Project. The Rancho Colorado Archaeological and Oral History Project is a partnership which involves students in archaeological, historical, and oral history research, focusing on our Hispanic heritages and cultures. This initial goal was to preserve and protect an early 20th century Mexican migrant farm laborers' historic cemetery located along a creek on the Flinn Farm. As we discovered descendants of those buried there, our quest involved learning more about the people and the farm so that we can document a bygone era of our rural history. The Flinn Farm represents a chapter in our farming history in South Texas where workers lived, worked -- and some died and were buried on the farm or ranch. Many of these cemeteries are still on private land today. At one time there were numerous smaller vegetable oriented owner operated farms in the 20th Century in Nueces County. Today, they are leased lands and part of the major milo and cotton growing fields in our 21st Century farming operations, with the early history of these sites not widely known. Offered as an Archaeology course in the Spring of 2012 at Texas A&M University Kingsville, we had 50 students participating in the project. Students from a variety of disciplines/majors assisted in preserving the site through brush removal, grave location identification, grave inscription decipherment, artifact discovery and inventorying, GIS inventory and mapping, and documentary research. Dr. Reiser Robbins documented the project, in a in the journal Interdisciplinary Humanities. The article, "Expanding Service Learning in the Humanities among First-Generation, Minority-Population, and Non-Traditional Students: A Mixed-Participation, Mixed-Assessment Model," and will be published this fall. This project has promoted the preservation of our cemeteries and county history and has become a multi year project with research being compiled into an application for State Historical Cemetery Protection and eventually an application for a Historical Landmark sign to mark the site. This not only raises awareness for the significance of the site, but contributes to the public representation of Hispanic heritage in the area. This project has also led to a collaboration with Humanities Texas and the Baylor University's Oral History Department. In February 2013, a Workshop and Symposium will be offered that will focus on conducting oral histories and presentations on a variety of Hispanic Oral History projects in South Texas. Work on the cemetery will continue in 2013 with research into grave identifications at the site and exploration of monument restoration and repair, as well as oral history interviews arranged after training of students and volunteers. 114	<p>In 2012, the Rockwall CHC worked on an expanded relationship with our county commissioners and county judge. We worked with the commissioners court in two expanded ways. The first was to partner with the court in order to devise a plan for the "history room" contained at the new courthouse. At the request of the court, the CHC helped develop a historical courthouse video that would play at the new courthouse and also presented plans for the contents of the history room. This is an on-going project with estimated completion in 2013. In addition, the court asked the commission to partner with them in hosting the annual county Christmas event. The Christmas event is held in the historic downtown area and opens the historic courthouse to the public where Santa is in the courtroom and carriage rides occur throughout the historic district. Refreshments are served and the square/courthouse are decorated in the style of a 1940s Christmas. The CHC and the Rockwall County Historical Foundation agreed to co-host this event and took over the planning in the fall of 2012. The reason for this shift was the pending retirement of a long-tenured county commissioner. Commissioner Jerry Wimpee had overseen this effort since its inception in 2002. However, with his retirement from the Commissioners Court, it became obvious that the continued success of the event would need to be administratively handled by another organization. The Court looked to the CHC to help provide continuity and guidance for the annual event. This expanded partnership provided a "value added" component for the CHC as much of our work is behind the scenes and not always visible to the Commissioners Court except through annual reports. Much like the 2011 project to photograph all of the Comal County RTHL properties, our CCHC decided to photograph all of the remaining THC markers in Comal County. | 16 | <p>One great project that allowed us to help in the efforts being made to improve our interaction with the public in Hockley County began after we placed a Historical Marker in 2011 recognizing two historic minority cemeteries in Levelland. Because of the publicity given for the placement of the marker, we had a request from two women who had lost babies when the children were very young and the women believed their babies might be buried in one of these cemeteries but they had no records. One woman's son was still-born and buried when she was still in the hospital. The other woman had two children who died. She had given birth to a daughter and had complications. She had lost a baby girl in 1958 that was four months old and two years later she was in the hospital having a baby when her son that was just one year old died. Both women had been in the hospital, and never knew where either of their children were buried. One of our members, Barbara Beadles, has done exhaustive research in the cemetery records and she was able to provide these women with the information about the death records and burial of their children. Our historical commission voted to buy and provide individual cemetery markers to be used at these cemeteries and others in the county. A transcript of the article that appeared in the Levelland News-Press follows.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">_____ Hockley County Historical Commission</p> <p>Provides Markers for Historic County Cemeteries The individual cemetery markers recently purchased by the Hockley County Historical Commission were acquired from Harvey Roseberry at the McNeill Grave Marker Co. Mr. Roseberry was very interested in our project to provide markers for these neglected graves and arranged to sell them to us at a discounted rate. The members of the Hockley County Historical Commission voted to buy these markers to allow families to place a loved ones name on their gravesite. McNeill Grave Marker Co. is a division of Heaton-Bowman-Smith and Sidenfaden Chapel located in St Joseph, Missouri. This funeral home is the same one that prepared the body of Jesse James for burial. The story of these markers began when members of the Hockley County Historical Commission were contacted by two women trying to locate the graves of their children in the hispanic cemetery. Each of these women had given birth to babies that did not live. Because of the difficulty surrounding the births, and each woman's medical conditions, they were unable to attend their own babies' burials. All they knew was that the babies may have been buried in the hispanic cemetery west of Levelland. Tragically, one of these mothers also lost her one year old child during the time when her newborn died and while she was still in the hospital, so two of her children were buried without her being present. These women appealed to the historical commission after hearing about the recent placement of a historical marker recognizing the Hockley County Cemetery, also known as the North Side Cemetery. Hispanic and African American residents of Hockley County. The two women wanted to know if any of our members might know of cemetery records that would help them in their search. For the past sixty years it had been their heart's desire to find their babies' graves and make sure that their names were acknowledged. The Hockley County Historical Commission wanted to do more to acknowledge the burials in these cemeteries by providing individual markers. These seemed cost prohibitive. HCHC member, Bette Hope, contacted her nephew, Nathan Zalman, at Sanders Funeral Home in Lubbock about a source for an affordable marker. Marker Committee consists of members from various communities within Bell County. Each member is the primary contact with individuals or organizations desiring to apply for a historical marker. It has been suggested that burial in our older / abandoned cemeteries might be an option to consider. In 2012, new interest was aimed toward an abandoned cemetery located in Jefferson County. Lincoln Burial Park (also known as Broussard Cemetery) is a long, narrow, heavily overgrown, abandoned cemetery with overgrowth so thick that it is not possible to physically go more than a few feet into the cemetery. One JCHC member, owner of a commercial lawn service with equipment to cut heavy foliage, has not been able to get but a few feet onto cemetery property. This is used by the general public as a research tool to find county and family histories. In our archives, researchers can find cemetery records, funeral records, census records, some school records, birth records, death records, and marriage records. We also maintain, on microfilm, many of Wise County's local newspapers dating back one hundred years. This collection was initiated by the Wise County CHC Chair before we even had a library. With funds received from Wise County, we have been able to assemble an array of books on family histories, Wise and other county histories, and state histories. Much of our collection has been donated by individuals interested in preserving local history. We also have a major exhibit we call our Lost Battalion Room. This room is dedicated to POW's from World War II who were held prisoners of the Japanese and forced to build a railroad through the jungle (using only manual labor) that led to the famed bridge over the River Kwai. This exhibit brings many people to the Museum as many of the prisoners were from our area in addition to survivors from the ship U.S.S. Houston. As this room contains artifacts and writings from many of these former prisoners, it is of particular interest to the many veterans who visit our Museum. Since our Museum building was the former administration building for Decatur Baptist College, we maintain a good deal of historic items from the years that the college operated here. We were made aware by some older citizens of a "Lost Cemetery" that was the very first one in our county seat of Ballinger, the countys' second county seat. Then a wildfire on 60 mile per hour winds swept across 40,000 acres of range land and threatened the town of Matador and the Matador Ranch headquarters. What the drought hadn't destroyed, the fire did. Miles and miles of fences were destroyed; some herds were destroyed, others had feet and lungs burned. Baby calves starved because their mother's bags were burned. Of the cattle left in the country, some died from eating all that remained, toxic weeds. It was the toughest time many of us had faced in our seventy or more years of ranching. This year we featured pictures of historical markers. Our theme next year will be rural schools of yesteryear. We partnered with the City of Edgewood to reclaim, research and preserve an old city-owned cemetery near downtown. We worked with a girl scout troop and with a boy scout to earn his merit badge on this project. We would also like to expand on Item 38 – Goal 5 – “Learn and Experience History through Place”. Our members are very active in participating in local festivals, museums, events, and speaking to local schools and civic groups about historical events and preservation of artifacts. The Edgewood Heritage Park, managed by a CHC member, holds several events throughout the year, and CHC members help provide tours for groups of school children and demonstrations of historic and cultural events such as printing a newspaper, quilting, blacksmithing, spinning, washing on a scrub board, and cooking over an open fire. The park is also available on-call for tours for school children. Another CHC member refurbished an old school, and as a community outreach to children, he installed a children’s library and offers story-telling events. He partnered with Half-Price Books to provide free books for those children coming to the library. He also refurbished an old syrup mill and CHC members give demonstrations of syrup making. Other members volunteer at the historic Van Oil Museum providing tours of it and an adjacent log cabin. Still others provide tours of historic routes across our county (Dallas-Shreveport Road and Tyler-Porters Bluff Road, both old Caddo trade and immigrant trails.) Members of our CHC have spoken before Chambers of Commerce, genealogical societies, Lions Clubs, historical societies, Kiwanis Clubs, retired teachers associations, and at schools. We partnered with the Dallas-Shreveport Road Association on research for the historical marker for Slaughter School. We partnered with the Greenwood Cemetery Association and St Marks Methodist Episcopal Church on the historical marker for Elbert Gray.

He named it Hockley City. In doing research for our historical commission, John Hope recently located the original plat map for that county seat. Our group plans to produce a copy of the map for the Hockley County Courthouse and for the Post-Montgomery headquarters here in Levelland. We also want to do a survey of the historic location of Silver Lake in Northwest Hockley County. We have permission from the landowner to do this and hope to mark significant places using GPS data especially the spring locations there. Our group continues to help maintain geo-cache sites that we helped place for the Buffalo Soldier Trail project done in cooperation with Cochran County Historical Commission and Dr. Elizabeth Loudon and her associates. This was also done in coordination with Terry and Lynn Counties. Levelland is known in the Texas Travel Guide as "The City of Mosaics" because we have 12 large scale glass-tile mosaics throughout the city. Some of the older art works are in some need of repair and after John & Bette Hope presented a program on the mosaics to the Womens Club, the group donated money for repair of one of the mosaics. Our historical commission voted to establish a repair fund. John & Bette have designed and created some of the recent mosaics and have done repair on others. They traveled to Italy in 2005 to study traditional mosaic techniques. The Hopes also completed the most recent mosaics on the Hockley County Courthouse Square using the difficult micro-mosaic technique they studied in Italy. These small mosaics are very detailed and took almost two years to create. One mosaic shows Hockley County before settlement, with Native American tipis, bison grazing, and an early dugout. The other mosaic shows the county after settlement, depicting an early windmill, the prairie being plowed for crops, the first train in 1925, and more modern development. This project was supported by the Hockley County Commissioners and Main Street.

34 Harris County Historical Commission The state marker program is, perhaps, one of the Commission's most visible activities for education and heritage tourism. Once erected, for decades a marker stands witness to the importance our society gives to a person, structure, event, or, even, a phenomenon. Completing a project requires two, sometimes three, years of research, narrative writing, validation of facts by a review committee, packet preparation for submission to THC, and, once approved, scrutiny of THC's proposed inscription to ensure that it is accurate and as complete as space permits. During 2012 Harris County submitted applications for eight markers (including one Undertold Story and multiple replacement markers) and reviewed nineteen proposed inscriptions. And, our members and clients started new projects for submission in 2013 for installation in 2014 or 2015. Every Commissioners' precinct was represented with subjects as varied as Rice University to the Murals at Hannah Hall and the Port of Houston to small churches; and, in time, from the Bayland Orphans Home to former Governor Connally's home in River Oaks. Harris County is well blessed with historical markers and in worthy topics. The state marker program is handled by an experienced commission member with a full committee of excellent historians. The HCHC Marker Inventory Chairman maintains a database for all of the historical markers in Harris County, to include makers of significance which support county history but in most cases erected prior to the creation of the official state marker program. In all 520 markers are identified and documented. This information is reported & searchable via the HCHC website; to include marker text, directions to the marker site, photos of the marker & site, and factual corrections and updates to the marker text if applicable. discovered on their ranch in 1927. The initial grand opening was on October 30, 1930. This renovation project was funded by a man that was born in Big Spring, attended the local high school, and later became a successful entrepreneur. His company worked closely with the National Registry of Historic Properties to capture and restore the style and grandeur of the original building. Although our local CHC was not directly involved in this project, the remodeling of this building brought renewed interest and appreciation for historical preservation. A highlight of the year was the dedication of the Confederate marker at Mt. Olive cemetery on November 17, 2012, honoring Private Calvin McKee, Co. E, 1st Arkansas Calvary (Monroe's). He served from May 26, 1862 - June 11, 1863. The ceremony was hosted by the Sons of Confederate Veterans and Order of the Confederate Rose. In conjunction with city officials, two commission members conducted research and completed requirements for securing this marker.

The Jefferson CHC received a request for assistance from a Sam Houston State University professor in locating headstones of Africian-American WW I veterans. Two cemeteries in Port Arthur and one in Beaumont were surveyed; photographs of headstones were made and information was forwarded by email / CD. Another request was received from a Stephen F. Austin University professor for pictures of headsones of members of the Mosaic Templars of America. Cemeteries were again surveyed, headstones located, photographed and information was forwarded by email / CD. A request for informatiion was received about the small community of Cheek located in west Jefferson County, The JCHC worked with the Commissioner of that precinct and with several long-standing residents of that area in finding the requested information. From this request, the JCHC learned of celebrations, name changes and historical facts not in our files. This information was helpful in the decision to apply for CLG grant funding to develop a cultural resoures survey. The JCHC was in contact over several months with an individual doing research for a book based on his grandparents' relocation from the northern United States to the Hamshire-Fannett area of Jefferson County in the early 1900s. His main interests were information concerning transporting cattle by railroad from the northern US to this area and also names of business located in Beaumont at that time. One of our members, a railroad historian, was able to research and locate information desired. Several other members were able to help to find pictures of downtown Beaumont and also provided lists of businesses at that time.

Prior to the meeting attendees were invited for coffee and muffins and a brief tour and history of Apache Pass (optional), a Milam County and El Camino de los Tejas National Trail significant site. County Judge David Barkemeyer welcomed the group, Amy Hammons presented important and current statistics about CHCs and shared THC literature. Amy had time for attendees to ask questions after her presentation. During the meeting we discussed successes and challenges facing CHCs today, activities, programs and concerns. We had lunch at Apache Pass, being able to visit informally during and after lunch, before continuing the meeting. Participants signed a signup sheet sharing e-mails so we could maintain contact. I e-mailed the list of contact information to everyone on the list. Feedback from those attending the meeting was very positive and plans were made to meet again next year in Williamson County. Since the Area Meeting I have hear from several participants asking questions or inviting Milam County Historical Commission to workshops or other activities. 90% of MCHC members attended the meeting and a majority of MCHC members took part in planning, preparing and making sure that it was a successful and purposeful meeting. MCHC also partnered with the Milam County Master Naturalists at their Nature Festival this year. We planned and manned an archaeology dig for children. MCHC member speak about Native Americans in Milam County and learned about becoming an archaeologist on a dig. Then they completed the documentation for their 'artifact' with help from MCHC and community volunteers. Parents and children alike enjoyed the activity and learning. Many children came back for a second change to dig. For the past 5 years we have had a Preservation Grant to promote, protect and preserve Milam County history. Over the past years the grant has been responsible for well over \$100,000 worth of historic preservation in Milam County. The grant this year was funded by donations from: the City of Rockdale, Milam County, the city of Thorndale, the community of Buckholts and citizens of Gause. The grants have been very successful, every year we have at least five grants awarded. In 2012 we awarded five grants for historic markers, ECR signage, historic theater renovations, historic train car renovations, beginning a library for historic documents in a Milam County church and a roof for a historic building. It is very gratifying to be able to see history preserved in our county.

A total of six missions and a presidio (of seventy plus people) were founded in 1716 by Domingo Ramon and a large group of missionaries, and El Camino Real de los Tejas was first established. After a short abandonment in 1719 due to invasion by the French, the Marquis de Aguayo returned in 1721 and reestablished the six missions and a new presidio at Los Adaes. The Nacogdoches County Historical Commission has a great opportunity to expound upon this history with properly located educational signs and subject markers.
